Lent Daily Devotional 2026

Wednesday, February 18 (Ash Wednesday) Psalm 133

Our lent journey begins at Mount Hermon, the likely site of Jesus' transfiguration. To the ancients and people of today, Mount Hermon is considered a place of blessing. The snow melting from Mount Hermon provides lush green foothills and water for the Jordan River. In our Psalm reading today, David compares our dwelling in unity as people to the blessing of "precious oil poured on the head." In other words, that unity is like the blessing of water flowing from the mountain to sustain the people of Israel. We can make the direct correlation of our being sustained in our oneness in Christ, the source of all our blessings.

Think about areas where you can bring people together in unity in your life and in the church. Pray for unity in the church that flows from our source of life in Jesus Christ.

Thursday, February 19

Luke 9:28-32

Don't forget the obvious here; Jesus takes Peter, James, and John up the mountain to pray. Sometimes we focus on the brilliant light of the transfiguration and the sight of Moses and Elijah talking with Jesus about his bringing fulfillment of the Law and the prophecy of the coming messiah. It is important to remember, the original point of this journey up the mountain was to pray. It is during this time of prayer that Jesus, glory is fully revealed to Peter, James, and John.

I encourage you to pray and consider the times God has revealed His glory to you in great ways and in small, quiet, private ways as well during and immediately following times of prayer.

Friday, February 20

Luke 9:33-34

Peter's response is typical Peter; he may not always know what he is saying, but he is faithful and wants to do the right thing. Peter has genuine faith and realizes that something very special is happening and he wants to enjoy this moment. We sometimes want to do that as well. We like the mountaintop experiences, and we want to savor them, we want them to last permanently. Our faith however, requires us come down from the safety and excitement of the mountaintop and live (share) our faith in our difficult and sometimes mundane world.

While we desire those exciting mountaintop experiences, they are not where we live out our faith. I encourage you to pray that with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we will respond graciously and joyfully to the everyday opportunities we have to share our faith and serve to make another person's life better.

Saturday, February 21

Luke 9:35-36

Before any reply is given to Peter's sincere, but misguided request, the voice of heaven is heard, and God tells Peter, James, and John that Jesus is His Son, and they should "listen to Him." There is no response; only silence from the witnesses as Jesus' glory is revealed by God the Father. We should not overlook the obvious message here as well; God is telling us to listen to Jesus as much as He is telling Peter, James, and

John. My grandfather used to tell me; “you have two ears and one mouth, use them in proportion.” Let us be slow to speak and quick to listen to the words of Jesus.

Pray today for quiet time to listen for the voice of God speaking to us through the Holy Spirit and Scripture.

Sunday, February 22

2 Peter 1:16-18

In this letter, Peter seeks to remind us of the true message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He implores us not to fall victim to clever stories made by false prophets. Jesus will come in power and glory and Peter states with confidence that he, James, and John were witnesses to His glory on the sacred mountain. As one reads this it is easy to make the link to Peter’s sermon at Pentecost; “God has raised this Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses of the fact. Exalted to the right hand of God, He has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear.” (Acts 2:32-33)

Let’s pray for the Holy Spirit to speak truth to us, and listen carefully, so we never fall victim to any false teachings or false teachers.

Monday, February 23

Luke 9:37-43a

I often find it amazing how quickly Satan makes his appearance after we have a wonderful experience in our faith journey. Peter, James, and John just had one of those “mountaintop experiences” in their faith journey and the moment they get off the mountain they are greeted by a boy possessed by demons. Have you ever gone on a spiritual retreat or conference with other Christians and had a great time worshipping God and you feel totally uplifted and energized only to be immediately greeted with something that makes you angry or brings you down? This passage reminds us to go back to the voice of God on the mountain and listen to Jesus.

Don’t forget: While we might be as powerless to heal as the disciples were, Jesus is not. Pray that when we face difficult circumstances that we will turn to Jesus (listen to Him) and not let these situations in life overcome our faith and lead us away from Jesus.

Tuesday, February 24

Luke 5:12-13

Yes, this week’s devotional theme is healing. Today we see a man who fell at Jesus’ feet with his face to the ground. He confesses his faith to Jesus knowing that if Jesus is willing, he can be “made clean.” Notice that Luke doesn’t just use the word healed, but “made clean.” People associated these types of diseases with some kind of sin during those days, and we can’t overlook the redemptive nature of this healing. While Jesus may not heal us of all our physical ailments (for example – Paul was not healed of his ailment) He will cleanse us from our sins, that is, make us clean in the eyes of God. To receive this blessing, we just have to do what the leper did, believe and confess our faith in him as Lord and Savior.

I urge you to give thanks in your prayer today that Jesus was and is willing to make us clean from our sins against God.

Wednesday, February 25

Psalm 30:1-4

David exalts God; he praises God for lifting him out of the depths. He cried out to God and He healed him. Like the healing we read about in our two previous devotionals, we must ask God for healing, we must believe and confess to receive it. Notice that David specifies the healing in verse 3; it is not just physical healing, but spiritual healing as well. While physical healing is temporary, spiritual healing is eternal. Sometimes we get too caught up in desiring healing that is only temporary and not treasuring eternal healing. Of course, pray for physical healing and praise God when He chooses to provide it, but let us always make sure our hearts are grounded in the eternal kingdom.

Let us praise God today and exalt Him in prayer for eternal healing that He lovingly provides us.

Thursday, February 26

John 5:1-8

It is ironic that Jesus would ask the paralytic if he would want to be healed. It is heart breaking to think that someone might not want to be healed; but this is the case at some level with all of us. Some find it so difficult to imagine life without an addiction, and they would rather live with what they know than face the unknown. Others of us have a sin in our life we don't want to give up because it provides some perceived happiness, and we are afraid to live without it. Either way, it begs Jesus to ask the question; "Do you want to be healed?" It begs us to ask the question; "Are we ready to allow Jesus to heal us?"

Let us cry out to God in prayer, yes, I want to be healed and pray for those we know who at this point have resisted healing in Jesus Christ. Pray for the Holy Spirit to open hearts and minds and allow Jesus in.

Friday, February 27

Matthew 8:5-13

Many had faith that Jesus could heal them. This isn't unusual to this story. What is different is that a Roman Centurion is telling Jesus He doesn't need to come, that he isn't worthy to host Him. The centurion doesn't want Jesus to be put in the situation of having to answer for going into his home. So the centurion states in faith, "Just speak the word Lord and my servant will be healed" shows a depth of faith greater than any found in Israel according to Jesus.

Unlike our passage from yesterday, this healing isn't initiated by the one being healed, but through the faith of another. We are called to pray for others to be healed; for the Holy Spirit to open their hearts to Jesus' presence. Pray that physical healing might open people to the permanent Spiritual healing available in Jesus Christ.

Saturday, February 28

Luke 8:40-48

Today we see another example of great faith. This woman, ill for 12 years had faith that if she only touched Jesus' garment, she would be healed. I don't need to bother Jesus; I don't need Him or anyone else to notice me; I just need to touch His garment. Jesus however wanted everyone to see her faith. He wanted everyone to know that healing (that peace in life) comes through faith. Notice Jesus said, "Go in Peace". In other words, don't be troubled with your illness anymore for you have found peace today in Jesus Christ.

Jesus often greeted people who were scared with the words; “peace be with you.” He wanted this woman and us to know not just healing, but to know peace in Christ. He wants us to know that same peace in Him. Please pray for Jesus’ peace in our hearts and the hearts of others who do not know Him.

Sunday, March 1

Mark 10:46-52

Blind Bartimaeus is one of my favorite people in the Bible. He shouted to Jesus in faith. Even when people told him to be quiet, he shouted even louder, “Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me.” Do we quiet our praise of God at times because people are put off by our loud praise of God? Have you ever told someone to be quiet; have you ever shushed a child who is praising God (expressing their faith) in their own way. Bartimaeus was taking no chances. No one was going to silence his faith and get in the way of his one shot to be healed by Jesus.

Don’t ever allow anyone to silence your praise of God and please don’t ever seek to silence another’s praise of God. Pray that we will always find the voice and courage to praise the Lord, even when people are trying to silence us.

Monday, March 2

Luke 10:1-3

We shift our focus this week to Jesus’ desire for his disciples to share their faith with others. In his journey from the transfiguration to Jerusalem, Jesus sent the 72 out to share the peace of Christ with others. Jesus made it clear that this would not be easy. He uses the metaphor of sending sheep out amongst the wolves. Today it feels like that at times, but the harvest field today is just as ripe as it was then.

While evangelism seems overwhelming; remember Who sends you out, remember the one who walks with you, Jesus. We all share in this calling to share Jesus’ grace and peace with others. Pray for and depend on the Holy Spirit to equip us with all we need to carry out this mission.

Tuesday, March 3

Matthew 13:3-9

I suspect you’ve heard this parable many times. One message is clear to us, go and sow the seeds. Some will never sprout, some will sprout and wither, some with sprout and grow even, but never come to full fruit. Others, however, will produce huge yields! We can’t control the heart that hears the message, we can only sow the seed. Our call is to sow the seed. Our success is measured in sowing the seed not in how the person responds. Often, we will never see the response.

The question we need to ask is this, how have we responded to the message and are we sowing the seeds of faith in others? We can only control our response and not others. Go as Mark 16:15 tells us; “Go into all the world and preach the good news to all creation.” Let us pray for the courage to share the Good News of Jesus Christ and that people will hear and respond by confessing their faith in Him.

Wednesday, March 4

Isaiah 6:8

Is Jesus calling out to you? Is the Holy Spirit placing someone in front of you today saying, "I want you to talk with this person, I want you to show them kindness and share your faith with them." When I asked this question did you say, oh no and begin getting nervous? Don't look at your calling this way. This is truly a gift to us. Jesus wants all of us to share in ministry with Him. Again remember, God is sending you and He will equip you with everything you need to sow the seeds of faith, let Him worry about the results. The only time we fail is when we don't speak up and share the Good News.

Pray for those God is calling you to visit and know that He will walk with you and equip you with the words you need.

Thursday, March 5

John 20:21/Acts 1:8

Is anyone still nervous about yesterday's devotional and God sending you out to others? Jesus tells us in these two passages today not to be nervous at all. He says to us, peace be upon you for I'm not sending you alone, the Holy Spirit will, yes will, be with you. I remember the first time I was sent to someone to share God's peace with people – ask me about it next time you see me. I remembered very little about that encounter right after it happened, except that God granted me great peace in the hours, days, and weeks following. In Jesus' words; "Peace be upon you."

Friday, March 6

Psalms 67

David reminds us in this Psalm that the harvest begins with the praise and worship of God. Faithfulness by believers will result in all people experiencing God's blessing and salvation. When we worship and praise God, when we seek God's blessing and praise Him joyfully, the land will yield its harvest.

Want the church to yield a great harvest (want the church to grow?), then make worship a priority every Sunday! David did, as did Jesus! Pray for the strength and energy to worship God always, each and every day of our lives.

Saturday, March 7

Matthew 28:18-20/Mark 16:15

Ever been in a locker room right before a game, the coach is giving the final instructions, the pep talk? Normally the coach emphasizes one specific teaching point that's been emphasized many times in practice. The coach has equipped the players and now he must turn the game over the players. He or she can't play and they use this last minute to encourage the players before sending them out. This is exactly what Jesus does in our passages today. This is what I want you to do. This is your number one assignment above all else!

Let us follow Jesus' instruction. Let us go and preach the good news and in so doing make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!

Sunday, March 8

Romans 10:14-15

Are your feet beautiful? That would be a very strange question if not asked in the context of today's passage. We are sent to preach the Good News of Jesus. Why? Because we believe in the promise of eternal life that He has made to us. Jesus anointed us to do just that. This calling is not just to pastors or elders, but every single person young and old and in between. This call is to all who know Jesus and have confessed their faith in Him. Some say the future of the church is with the young. The truth is, in God's eyes we are all young. The future of the church, the Kingdom of God is the truly the next person who confesses their faith in Jesus Christ.

Ask God to make your feet beautiful by providing people in your life to share your faith with!

Monday, March 9

1 Peter 2:9-10

We belong to God; we can never forget that simple fact. God chose us when He sent His Son Jesus to save us. Jesus, the light of the world called us out of the darkness and into His wonderful light. We have received his mercy!

Take time today to bask in God's brilliant light and remember that we belong to God, He chose us!

Tuesday, March 10

Mark 4:9-12

"He who has ears to hear, let him hear." I mentioned earlier, my grandfather often said to me, "God gave you two ears and one mouth, use them in proportion." I guess that also goes along with Psalm 46:10; "Be still and know that I am God." God wants us to talk to him, but He also wants us to slow down and listen so He can talk to us as well. This week we will focus on the Gospel, which is the Good News of Salvation found in Jesus Christ.

Remember to take time to read scripture and meditate on it and allow God to speak to you.

Wednesday, March 11

1 John 1:1-4

John seems to be speaking for all the disciples here when he testifies to the source of all life which they have seen. Take time if you have it to read the first fourteen verses of John's Gospel as today's scripture is like an echo of that passage. All the disciples did when they were on the road was preach their story, what they had experienced and what Jesus taught them, during the three years they traveled together. This letter, just like the Gospels, seeks to tell their story, the story of Jesus to us. Jesus is the source of all life; without him we live in darkness and we would certainly die; with Jesus there is no darkness and we will never die.

John said they wrote to make their joy complete. Perhaps in sharing the gospel we too will find our joy complete!

Thursday, March 12

John 3:16

“For God so loved the world...” How great is God’s love for us that He would sacrifice His Son for us? I know how much I love my children and I can’t imagine the love it would take to ask my children to give their life for someone I love. God loves us enough to do just that, and Jesus loves the Father and us enough to say yes and to make that sacrifice. God loves us that much! How beautiful is that and how beautiful does that make our God!

Pray today for the faith and courage to share with others the love God lavished on us.

Friday, March 13

Psalms 27:4

God said that David was a man after God’s own heart. When we look at David’s life we see someone very faithful but also broken by sin as well. Despite failures in his life, David maintained a desire for God that is some would say is unmatched in the Bible. David expressed his desire to see God’s beauty and to worship God every day. Some even describe this as David’s obsession. What a joy to be obsessed by God’s beauty!

Pray today to be obsessed with the faithfulness to know and see God’s glory that David had.

Saturday, March 14

Luke 10:27

God’s desire for our lives can be fully explained in these two commands. Some have even narrowed it to four words; Love God, Love People. Zig Ziglar said: “You can have everything you want in life if you just help enough people get what they want in life.” We were created by God for just this kind of life, for just this kind of relationship with God and our family, friends, and neighbors.

Pray for the opportunity to serve others and in so doing, serve God.

Sunday, March 15

Matthew 7:24-29

We’ve all watched the news and seen beach-front homes consumed by storms in a matter of hours. God uses this rather simple metaphor to ask us on what foundation we have built our lives. I’ve had the pleasure of walking with people through some of the most difficult times in their lives, cancer, divorce, disease, betrayal, job loss, and death of loved ones. I’ve watched how their secure foundation in Christ weathered even the most difficult storms. Faith doesn’t mean we will never have storms in our life, but faith does mean we’ll always have Jesus walking through those storms with us.

Whatever storm you may be facing, pray for God to walk you through it and know you will be stronger having faced the storm with Jesus by your side.

Monday, March 16

Matthew 5:5

Jesus says, “blessed are the meek.” Some in society would translate this to weak, but that is not the case at all. What Jesus is speaking to here is humility. The powerful, the dominating in society, seek to establish their own kingdoms which will not last. Jesus tells us that those who are humble and respectful of others help to grow the Kingdom of God. These are the people who will inherit the earth, because what they create has a lasting impact.

As we explore the Bible's teachings on humility this week, let us ponder those areas in our life where our pride has led us to building our own kingdoms rather than seeking to build Gods.

Let us pray that God will help us recognize those idols in our life and give them up to Him.

Tuesday, March 17

Romans 12:3-8

Paul begins by reminding everyone of grace. Without grace we have nothing. Paul reminds us that all our gifts given for ministry start with the grace of God. First, we receive grace and recognize the source of grace (Jesus Christ) and then according to God's grace we receive additional gifts for the building up of the church. We are reminded in grace to give generously of our time and talent and to show mercy and to do it all cheerfully.

Pray today for the faith and trust to give joyfully and generously, knowing God provides all we need.

Wednesday, March 18

Proverbs 22:1-4

I would recommend to everyone, take 31 days sometime soon and read through Proverbs. Read one chapter per day. The Book of Proverbs is full of great advice. Today's has to do with humility. Humility in following God's word will bring about wealth, honor, and eternal life. One may not become wealthy as our culture views wealth, but one will find wealth in relationships with family and friends where it truly matters. One will always find honor in that you will never have to apologize for putting your wants ahead of the needs of God and others. Let us all pray today that we will stay humble before God and our family and friends.

Thursday, March 19

Philippians 2:3-7

There is no more perfect example of humility than that of Jesus. Jesus always put the interests of others first in His life. He put the interests of His Father first and He put the interest of His bride (the church) first as well. Let us always follow Christ's example and put the needs of others first in our lives, just like Jesus. Let us pray for the humility and generosity to always look to others first.

Friday, March 20

Colossians 3:12-14

Today we are reminded of the traits God wishes for us to display, to reflect in our lives. We are asked to bear with each other and to forgive as God forgave us. Pride often gets in the way of our ability to wear and model these traits in life. It is pride that gets in the way of forgiveness. Let us all think about and pray about the areas of pride in our life, that prevent us from clothing ourselves in compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience and prevent forgiveness.

Saturday, March 21

1 Peter 5:6-9

Have you ever been anxious, uncertain, on edge...? Anyone who answers no is probably about to say, April Fools! I think we've all been there sometime. Today's passage reminds us to give all our anxiousness to God. We know that something is always out there waiting to distract us and put us on edge. We are never alone in our journey; many are there with us. All of us have faced suffering and we can all help one another to stand firm in our faith. Pray today for yourself and others that you know are facing anxiousness and uncertainty.

Sunday, March 22

Mark 9:35

The disciples were arguing about who is the greatest, yes ego was an issue then too. Jesus tells us that in the Kingdom of God the measurement of greatest is determined by the level of service. Jesus modeled this passage for us perfectly. He indeed served all. This coming week make a list and do something to serve someone every day; your spouse, your children, your neighbor, someone from the church, or a stranger. Pray that God will provide opportunities to anonymously serve a stranger, friend, or even an enemy.

Monday, March 23

Luke 8:49-53

Jesus was on his way to Jarius house to heal his daughter, but he was held up in the crowd and by a woman who touched His garment seeking healing. In that time Jarius daughter appears to have passed, but Jesus shrugs it off and says just believe and she will be healed. Certainly, this is a most anxious moment for any father, but Jesus reminds us to not be afraid, just believe. This week our journey will eventually take us to Lazarus house and yet another reminder of the power Jesus has over death. Jesus' response to the news indicates just how He wants us to respond, "don't be afraid, just believe."

Tuesday, March 24

Luke 7:11-17

In response to Jesus' compassion to the mother and the raising of her son, the people were said to be filled with awe and praised God. Are we filled with awe when we think about Jesus or has He just been compartmentalized into our life? Do we praise God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit like we are in awe, do we make a joyful noise to the Lord? Are we afraid to sing out; to cry out for fear someone might laugh at us? As the people exclaimed, God has come to help His people and the only appropriate response is to be in awe!

Let us always praise God for Who He is, King of Kings, and Lord of Lords, Savior to us all.

Wednesday, March 25

Mark 5:1-20

This is one of my favorite stories of the Bible and another story of one raised from the dead by Jesus. We may not think of this man as dead, but he truly was. So filled with demons he would always be alone since everyone feared him. This passage is a clear reminder that evil fears Jesus and evil must obey Jesus. When one calls out in Jesus' name for demons to go, they leave in fear. This man, Legion, went from uncontrollable to sitting dressed and in his right mind in a matter of moments. When the man was told to go back to his hometown and tell his story, he did just that. We are called to do the same. We don't need to tell someone the whole Gospel story; we just need to tell people how Jesus has healed us and made us more peaceful in this life.

Go and share your story of how Jesus has made you whole.

Thursday, March 26

2 Corinthians 5:17

There is no better passage to follow up on yesterday's story than this one. When we accept and believe in Jesus Christ, we are a new creation, the old is gone, the new is here. Paul tells us in this one sentence that the change will not be in question. Reflect on how Jesus has changed your life, how has Jesus made you a new creation.

Friday, March 27

Romans 6:1-5

Today's passage is yet another example of new life in Jesus Christ. When we were baptized, we were buried with Him and then raised to new life. Jesus died on the cross and was raised to from the dead to new life. Know that through our baptism and belief in Jesus Christ that when we die, we will be raised to new life as well. This is the promise of the Gospel; this is the foundation of our faith!

Saturday, March 28

Psalms 91:1-4

I encourage you to grab your Bible and read this entire Psalm. The author of this Psalm (probably Moses because verse 14 contains similar language to Deuteronomy 7:7), clearly understands and wishes to share the peace that is found in God. God will protect us and rescue us; He will be with us in times of trouble. Let us all find peace in the refuge of His wings.

Pray today for God to grant you His peace and for the opportunity to share His peace with others.

Sunday, March 29

Ephesians 2:1-6

"It is by grace we have been saved." Paul reminds us that we don't work for new life in Jesus Christ. On our own, we can do nothing to earn this new life anymore that those who Jesus chose to raise from the dead earned their new life. Like them, we are given new life through His grace. Pray for the Holy Spirit to be at work in the lives of those who have not committed their lives to Jesus Christ. Our passage tells us the Holy Spirit proclaimed that work in us and seeks now to work in others.

Monday, March 30

John 12:12-19

Today Jesus rides into Jerusalem to the cries of Psalm 118:26; "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" The people see Jesus coming into Jerusalem and want to make Him their King. Jesus will be their King and our King, but not in the manner they expected. I go back to the passage we read on March 22nd (Mark 9:35), "if one wants to be the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven, one must be servant to all." I'm humbled when I think about what must have been going through Jesus' mind as He rode into Jerusalem knowing He would be crucified in a few days and many who shouted Hosanna would soon shout Crucify Him...

Tuesday, March 31

John 12:20-26

This metaphor reminds us of what is required of us if we want to live like Jesus. Jesus had to die for the kingdom to multiply. The disciples in turn had to give up their lives to share Jesus with others for the Kingdom to multiply. Likewise, our life will not produce fruit unless we give it over to the Lord. A seed can

sit on a shelf for years, dry, dusty, and seemingly useless, but at the same time, full of potential. Take that seed, place it in the soil and water it and it can produce a crop 30-fold or more. In faithfulness to God, Jesus gave up His life and by faith we are called to do the same. Share the seed, share the Good News of Jesus with others, and pray for it to grow and produce fruit.

Wednesday, April 1

John 14:1-6

After predicting His betrayal and death, Jesus seeks to comfort His disciples with the words of this passage. He lets us all know that He has gone to prepare a place for us. When Thomas raises the question, Jesus reminds Thomas and us that all we must do is follow Him. For Jesus is The Way, The Truth, and The Life. Don't be deceived by those who would have you believe that there is another way to our Father in Heaven. As Jesus said, "Trust in God, trust also in me..."

Thursday, April 2 (Maundy Thursday)

Matthew 26:26-29

Today, we worship and celebrate the Lord's Supper much as Jesus did with His Disciples. We will do so knowing the entire journey that Jesus went through, unlike the disciples who were about to experience both unspeakable tragedy and disappointment only to experience joy like they could not have imagined. Come to the Lord's Table hungry for His Mercy and thirsting for His Joy!

Friday, April 3 (Good Friday)

Luke 23:39-43

I am in awe of this criminal. He was the first to understand what was really going on here. Somehow, he had heard Jesus' teachings and knew that even though his life had led him to a cross (which he confessed he deserved), Jesus could save him. The past does not matter when it comes to Jesus as Jesus can overcome any sin we commit and any sin anyone commits. Every single person we encounter can be saved in Christ, even the one on death row, the one who is addicted, the one who is the enemy of God. All can be saved and we need to share God's grace with them and pray for them. Remember, Jesus, through His Amazing Grace, saved a once wretched person like me and you.

Saturday, April 4

Luke 23:55-56

What must have been going through their minds as they mourned Jesus' death and the disciples feared for their lives? I also must ask you to imagine how the criminal must have felt! WOW!! Did they think of Jesus' words to the criminal or were they too overwhelmed with grief to remember anything they had heard or been taught by Jesus?

Pray that in our deepest grief, sorrow, and fear, that Jesus' words will always fill our minds, and we will know His peace.
